### President's Corner



Greetings for the month of April. Nice flying weather has finally arrived, and it looks like it will stick around for a while. Lots of stuff going on with the chapter these days, so I'll take a moment to review a few of the past and coming events.

We had an excellent program in March at our Fourth Saturday BBQ lunch. Former ATC controller Gary Veer presented an informative and entertaining program on the ins and outs of air traffic control. Along with that, the chapter enjoyed some fine food with pulled pork sandwiches and all the other good stuff provided by the cooking team led by Scott Whelan.

As you read this, we are also looking ahead to our April Fourth Saturday BBQ lunch on April 22.

Noted aviation author, photographer and editor Nicholas A. Veronico is our guest this month, and he will present a program on the obscure but intriguing field of Wreckchasing. Wreckchasing, for those who have not heard of such a thing, is the process of researching and documenting an old plane crash and then, if circumstances allow, trying to locate the crash site. There are dozens, probably hundreds, of crash sites in California that bear historical interest. Many years ago, I was able to document and visit the crash site of a rare B-17C that went down near Porterville a month before the 1941 attack on Pearl Harbor. Much of the airplane wreckage remained. Of the nine people aboard, all but the pilot managed to parachute from the bomber before it crashed. The documented history of the crew and the plane told an interesting tale. Nick Veronico is an expert on Wreckchasing and his presentation should be of great interest to the chapter.

April has five Saturdays, and we are taking advantage of that extra Saturday to hold the first organized chapter fly-out of the year...actually the first fly-out in several years. The destination is Nancy's Airport Café at the Willows Airport for a good brunch. More information and a link to sign-up for the Saturday event can be found elsewhere in this newsletter.

Each summer, the EAA Air Academy summer camp is held at Oshkosh, Wisconsin. Our chapter sponsors up to two kids each year using our chapter's Richard and Susan Bristow Memorial Scholarship Fund. This past month, we were happy to announce that Sam Mach and Prahlad Iyengar were selected from a very qualified group of applicants. It was a difficult choice, but we congratulate Sam and Prahlad and look forward to hearing about their summer adventures.

Along the same lines, as I write this we are in the process of selecting our chapter's nominee for the EAA Ray Scholarship. The Ray Scholarship provides up to \$11,000 for flight training costs to get a young person started in aviation. The requirements of the program are stringent, but we have had four successful Ray Scholars over the past years, and we anticipate another one in the next year.

I've decided to postpone our planned "Basics of Riveting" class that we scheduled to hold on May 5. Details to come on when we will reschedule. I'll also mention that our chapter leadership team has decided not to have a Fourth Saturday BBQ for the month of May. The date falls on Memorial Day weekend, and we've identified a good group of chapter members who won't be in town that weekend. So, we will defer our appetites for a good BBQ lunch and program to our June BBQ meeting to be held on Saturday, June 24.

Aside from that, just about every weekend now has aviation opportunities available. Lots of fly-ins, pancake breakfasts, Young Eagle rallies, and the like are being held at airports in the area. We try to post as many as possible on our chapter calendar but do miss a few here and there. If you know of one that we are missing, let us know with a quick email to the chapter.


## April 22 BBQ Lunch and Program: Wreckchasing

Our chapter will be having our Fourth Saturday BBQ Lunch on Saturday, April 22, beginning at 11:00 at our hangar. Our Program for April will be a presentation by aviation author Nicholas A. Veronico on "Wreckchasing".

*Wreckchasing* is researching, locating, and documenting aircraft crashes and crash sites that occurred before 1970. As the nation's population expands, we are often encroaching upon historic aircraft crash sites. It is the job of the wreckchaser to respectfully locate and document these sites before they are scavenged by recyclers or built upon by developers. *Wreckchasing* is an avocation that combines meticulous research, detective work, and outdoor adventure.



**Nicholas A. Veronico** is the author of a number of aviation, military, and transportation books. He began looking for and documenting aircraft crash sites in the late 1980s, and in 1995 started the website <u>Wreckchasing.com</u>. His website's message board has become an on-line community for those interested in researching and finding aircraft crash sites. Most recently, his research led to the City of San Carlos, California, commemorating the March 1945 crash of a Navy R4D that impacted less than a mile and a half of his home. Sixteen servicemen survived the incident while seven perished.



On May 28, 1944, his grand uncle was lost in the 390th Bomb Group's B-17G "Decatur Deb." Nothing was known by his family of the loss until Nick began to further research the air war, which led to his book *Bloody Skies: U.S. Eighth Air Force Battle Damage in World War II*.

Nick will present on a number of aircraft crash sites, both civilian and military, that he has documented over the years. Nick will also have a few of his many books available for purchase including *Wreckchasing 101*, *PB4Y-2 Privateer*, and *Boeing 377 Stratocruiser*.

BBQ Lunch starts at 11:00 at our hangar at the Lincoln Regional Airport. If you are not familiar with our hangar's location, come to the airport and just follow the "EAA" signs.



The grill is hot from 11:00 a.m. until 11:45 a.m. when it shuts down, so come early. BBQ Lunch is \$10.00 for adults, \$5.00 for kids 12 or under, and \$25 for families.

# Chapter Fly-out April 29th

We are holding our first chapter fly-out of the year on Saturday, April 29. The participants will gather at 9:00 am at the Gazebo at KLHM and depart, en masse, for a fine brunch at Nancy's Airport Cafe located at the Willows/Glenn County Airport (KWLW). Willows is 64 fun-filled air miles northwest of Lincoln.



**So, we are also trying something new for this event.** We are using SignUpGenius to see if this will help organize the fly-out. We are asking all who wish to participate to use <u>this link</u> to go to the sign up

page, either as a pilot/plane or as a passenger. We'll try to include as many non-pilot chapter members as possible as passengers...this will depend on how many pilot/planes participate and the ability to accommodate passengers. We are limiting the passenger sign-ups to just ten individuals. Please note that we cannot promise that we will be able to get all the passengers who sign-up on an airplane going to Willows.

This is the first organized chapter fly-out we've had post-COVID, so we are putting our toe in the water to determine the interest in this and future fly-outs. (As of right now, we are planning fly-outs for the five-Saturday months this year...that would be April, July, and September.)

Also, a word of warning: we are using the free version of SignUpGenius which is very advertisementheavy. Verify <u>what</u> you are clicking on as you go through the signup process to ensure you are not actually clicking on an advertisement.

If this process works well, the chapter may spring for a paid, ad-less version of SignUpGenius.

## Treasurer's Report

**Members:** As of March 31<sup>st</sup>, our membership roster stands at 115 *Current Memberships*. Thank you for the continued support.

**Membership Dues**: Just a friendly reminder for those who have not paid your dues yet. The chapter changed to a simpler format, all memberships are now \$30 a year – individual and families. You can pay these on-line using PayPal, mail a check to our PO Box, or in person at any chapter meeting.
