President's Corner



Greetings for September. Our chapter's busy summer wrapped up with a bang with the City of Lincoln's Open House and Family Festival held the last Saturday of August. As anyone who has been attending our chapter events for the last few months knows, we were involved in a big way in the Open House. Let me briefly recap our chapter's participation.

First of all, we hosted a huge pancake breakfast. We had a large team of volunteers under the direction of Scott Whelan cooking and serving for the entire morning. All told, we prepared 408 breakfasts and, as a result of their hard work, the chapter achieved a net income of about \$2,381 for the effort. As per a board decision, the proceeds from the breakfast will be split evenly between our youth scholarship fund, our hangar fund, and our general fund.

We also realized about \$350 in direct donations to the chapter, all of which goes into the scholarship fund.

Our chapter had our two flight simulators set up and operating under the guidance of Dan Masys and his busy volunteer team. Through the very warm day, they provided 131 simulator rides to young and old alike. There was always a line at the simulator booth, so it was a popular attraction to the airport visitors.

The chapter had a booth set up where we provided information about our chapter, Young Eagles, scholarship programs, learning to fly, the airport, and aviation itself to hundreds of guests. Organized by Shirl Whelan and Cheryl Andrade, we answered lots of questions and have seen some positive feedback by families coming back to our September pancake breakfast wanting to learn more.

And, we supported the city of Lincoln with a cadre of pilot volunteers who helped provide ramp control of display aircraft as they arrived and departed from the ramp area. Under the direction of ramp boss Mark Siemens, we had about fifteen yellow-vested chapter members spend the day directing airplane movements. We also had Jim Hughes and Bruce Estes helping out by directing the classic car contingent find their way on and off the ramp's display area.

The spark plug behind the Open House was chapter member Richard Pearl who is also happens to be the Treasurer for the city. In conjunction with the city and the local Chamber of Commerce, plus all the volunteer groups, the Open House was a highly successful event on all counts and we look forward to the 3rd Annual Open House in 2024.

We've enjoyed a bit of summer success with our youth also. Our 2022-2023 Ray Scholar, Anthony Moreno, completed his Private Pilot checkride on Friday, August 11, a huge milestone and accomplishment. Our 2023-2024 Ray Scholar, Danielle Hanes, is well on her way in training for her private pilot certification and will no doubt have completed her first solo flight by the time you read this. And, our chapter sponsored two young people for the week-long EAA Air Academy at Oshkosh earlier in the summer, Sam Mach and Prahlad Iyengar. At our upcoming chapter BBQ Lunch on Saturday, September 23, we are asking each of these guys and gals to provide our chapter with short updates on their summer aviation experiences. At that same meeting, we'll also provide a bit of time for chapter members to share a bit about their Oshkosh adventures from this summer.

We are planning a Fifth Saturday fly-out in September...that would be September 30. We'll get as many chapter members, pilots, and planes together as possible and head out to the Willows Airport for another visit to Nancy's Restaurant. A signup link is provided elsewhere in this newsletter, so if you are interested in participating...get on the list!

Also, a reminder: our chapter will be holding a large Young Eagles rally on Saturday, October 14, at the Lincoln airport. We had hoped to fly 75 kids that day but we are instead closely watching how many volunteer Young Eagles pilots we will have available. Right now, we have four pilot/planes signed up, so we have thus limited the number of Young Eagles slots to 35 kids. You've heard this before, but if you have ever considered volunteering your piloting skills and plane to introduce kids to aviation, please consider becoming a volunteer Young Eagles pilot. The requirements are simple but take a few weeks to process. Please email back to the chapter if you are that guy or gal and we'll get you set up as a Young Eagles pilot.

And, finally, put Wednesday, December 13, on your calendar. That's the date for our chapter's annual Holiday Party, this year to be held at BJs in Roseville. It will be a bit different than year's past. It will be a buffet style dinner with a kid's menu, so we are encouraging more family participation from our chapter. Ticket prices will be more modest than in years past: \$40 for adults and \$15 for kids 12 and under. Tickets will go on sale at our 4th Saturday BBQ Lunch and Program on October 28. The holidays will be here before we know it, so we're planning ahead.

Project Updates and Adventures

I'm pleased to report the solution to my mag drop problem. The offending component was an oil saturated plug - a big relief from worries about having to pull the mag (again) and sending it to the manufacturer (again). After cleaning and reinstalling the plug, the engine fired right up and yielded only about an 80 rpm drop while running on the lower plugs alone, well within the 150 rpm drop allowed. Whew!

Now, back to taxi testing! Two long taxis the last couple of days have gone well.
