Join us on **Saturday, October 28**, for our monthly BBQ Lunch, short meeting, and program. This month, Scott Thompson will present on a widely known but less-understood topic: **Scrapping Our World War II Air Force**. Almost everyone has seen pictures of the endless rows of surplus warplanes gathered at remote desert fields after the end of World War II. Why were these bombers and fighters seemingly abandoned? Project Updates and Adventures

Brent Smith writes:

My progress report for the Mini-IMP this month is a case of "the good, the bad and the ugly:

Good: High speed taxi tests have been going well. For yesterday's test at 1,600 rpm, I got up to 60 mph and though "light" she was still just a little slow to pick up the nose. (I'm guessing 62 mph will do it.)



Bad: as I taxied back in and was only a few rows from my hangar, I advanced the throttle quickly to clear the plugs. There was a loud bang followed by the engine accelerating quickly to max without the prop providing a corresponding push. I cut the fuel pumps to kill the engine, shut everything down, got out and turned around. The bent cooling air vent (cowl flap) told me something had gone badly wrong with the Flexidyne, so I pushed her the rest of the way to the hangar. [Note: the Flexidyne is the dry fluid coupler between the engine and the long drive shaft back to the prop; it is essential to the use of such a configuration.]

Ugly: As shown here, the Flexidyne had suffered a "rapid self disassembly." Though clearly frustrating, removal of the Flexidyne was fairly easy, and it didn't take much investigation to find the cause: the screws attaching the Flexidyne's wavey plate to the output shaft had sheared sending screw heads out like bullets and adding pieces of the Flexidyne housing to the shrapnel (I found a piece on the taxiway yellow line behind where Minnie Hoonie came to rest).

I want to be clear here: it was my own fault. I checked my notes on my Flexidyne installation and found that I'd intentionally ignored Molt Taylor's admonition to add roll pins between the wavey plate mount screws. I'd convinced myself that previous

problems had all been with the smaller Flexidyne 8C and, since my 9C is so much bigger (including bigger screws), the roll pins weren't necessary. Wrong! Though this may have been the first such incident with the 9C, the failure mode was the same as for the 8C. The fact that my 9C is coupled to a larger engine reinforces the fact the troll pins are needed to take the torque and the mount screws are only there to hold it together.


Lesson learned: regardless of engine or Flexidyne size, install the prescribed roll pins. The FAA says Experimental aviation is about education and I get the privilege of paying for mine. I'm now searching for a new 9C; will pay cash if anyone has one to sell. :-)
