Chapter Scholarship Activity in August


Chapter sponsorship pays the camp tuition and a travel stipend to help defray the cost of airline flights.

Remembering "The Great Waldo Pepper"



The passing of actor Robert Redford on September 16 brings to mind his starring role in one of the best aviation movies to come out of the twentieth century. Or even the twenty-first century (sorry Maverick). Released by Universal Studios in March 1975...that's 50 years ago...*The Great Waldo Pepper* had a good story and some great flying, something a bit rare in aviation movies.

A quick review of the storyline highpoints: an early aviator, Waldo Pepper (played by Redford) learns to fly at the end of World War I but misses his chance of combat with the top German ace. He becomes a barnstormer but eventually runs afoul of new government regulations and is grounded. He soon enough becomes a movie stunt pilot on the sly, and finally gets his chance at aerial combat with that German ace. Some exciting aerial action ensues. It's a good story with some good actors. Besides Redford, there is a young Susan Sarandon and Bo Svenson, plus a host of others.

For aviation types like most of us, the airplanes are where the action is. A whole host of early, pre-1930s aeroplanes are utilized. No CGI involved. All real airplanes flown by real pilots doing real derring-do stuff. Noted fabled movie pilot Frank Tallman provided the planes and pilots for the film. Tallman, a long-time loving collector of antique aircraft, was in his element putting together the aerial sequences. His company, Tallmantz Aviation, was based at Orange County Airport down south, but filming locations were in Florida, Texas, and the Simi Valley area east of Oxnard. Tallman met his fate three years later while trying to duck under an overcast layer while flying back in to Orange County, so *Waldo Pepper* was his last great accomplishment as a movie pilot.

It's a highly recommended film. It's available to stream on several services...note, though, that it is on Netflix but scheduled to drop off that service on September 30...you have been warned. And for that rare crowd that still has a DVD player and actually knows how to work it...our

chapter's under-used DVD library has a copy for you to borrow. Check it out...it gets five out five propellers on my rating scale.

Project Updates and Adventures

I am beyond pleased to report that Mini-IMP serial number 2, *Menehune*, is again fully operational.



After finding success in the third iteration of the nose gear door retraction system, all the bits and bobs have been reinstalled and some may have seen me taxiing from one end of the runway to the other just getting comfortable again with the controls and monitoring the engine parameters.

All good so far and it's not impossible that there may have been air under the tires by the time this update is posted.

Jim Hughes writes:



I have an update on replacing the original 'rounded' wing tips on my Cessna 175B with Hoerner style wing tips. The aircraft also has flap gap seals, which were on it when I bought it.

The fuel use is consistent at 2 gph lower than the POH, so the aircraft now has over 6.5 hours of fuel.

A few months ago I was experiencing 'morning sickness' again, 200 hours after having a stuck exhaust valve.

I really didn't want to do the 'reaming' work again, so I tried adding TCP to the fuel, 1 oz per

10 gallons.

After 4 hours of flying, I noted that the engine starts smoothly, on all 6 cylinders, and it now idles smoothly at 700 rpm. Before adding TCP it would not idle smoothly below 800 rpm.

The annual is in October and I'm very interested in what the borescope of the cylinders looks like vs the prior 2 years.!
